Marty Griffin led in a moment of silence and Courtney Domokur led the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman McCoy called the meeting to order and welcomed everyone. 1. <u>Approval of Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MR. JACKSON, SECONDED BY MRS. DOMOKUR, the meeting agenda for November 7, 2022 was unanimously approved as presented.

2. <u>Public Comment</u>

Chairman McCoy reviewed the guidelines for public comment.

John Hogan, teacher - Friday was a big day for education in state of North Carolina. The State Supreme Court ordered the transfer of funds for *Leandro*. Can you fill us in? *Dr. McDaris indicated that he would give an update during his Superintendent's Update*.

3. <u>Good News Report</u>

Dr. McDaris recognized the student artwork from T. C. Henderson that was on display in the board room and thanked Officer Ray Owen for attending the meeting. He shared the following good news:

American Education Week & Annual Thanksgiving Meal

American Education Week is the week before Thanksgiving (November 13-19, 2022). It is a time to honor the people who work in our nation's public schools--everyone from bus drivers and classroom teachers to cafeteria workers and administrative staff. Each year the board adopts a local proclamation designating American Education Week in our county. Additionally, all current and retired school system employees are invited to a free Thanksgiving meal in the school cafeterias as guests of the board. This year's Thanksgiving meal will take place on Wednesday, November 16. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the board unanimously adopted a proclamation designating the week of November 13-19, 2022 as American Education Week in Transylvania County (see attached).

4. Former Students in the Military

In honor of Veterans Day on November 11, 2022, the board read aloud the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were 22 new names on the list.

5. <u>Consent Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MR. JACKSON, SECONDED BY MRS. DOMOKUR, the personnel report for November 7, 2022 board was unanimously approved (see attached).

6. <u>School Improvement Plans</u>

School improvement plans for PFES and TCH were presented as first-read information on October 18. Director Carrie Norris asked if there were any additional questions. Mr. Kiviniemi requested a yearly update on the three-year composite goals for reading and math. Mrs. Norris reported that a mid-year and yearly update would be provided. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the School Improvement Plans for Pisgah Forest Elementary School and T. C. Henderson School of Science & Technology were unanimously approved as presented.

School Improvement Plans for Brevard Elementary School, Brevard High School, Brevard Middle School, Davidson River School, Rosman Elementary School, Rosman High School, and Rosman Middle School were presented as first-read information. Directors Carrie Norris, Missy Ellenberger, and school principals discussed the plans and addressed questions from board members. ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the school improvement plans for BES, BHS, BMS, DRS, RES, RHS, and RMS were unanimously accepted as first-read information. Approval of the plans will be requested at the next regular meeting on November 21.

7. Budget Update

Finance Officer Gabi Juba presented an expenditure report and three budget amendments for FY23. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS.

DOMOKUR, the budget amendments for the State Public School Fund, the Local Current Expense Fund, and the Capital Outlay Fund were unanimously approved as presented (see attached).

8. Rosman High School CTE Roof Bid

Facilities Director Alan Justice presented the low bid of \$336,080 from J. A. Piper Roofing Company for the Rosman High School CTE wing roof repair project. Board approval is required for purchases in excess of \$90,000. Mr. Justice reported that the scope of the work will include roof repair, wall restoration, and replacement of three internal drains at RHS. The company expects to start work in 60 days. ON A MOTION BY MRS. DOMOKUR, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the board unanimously approved the \$336,080 bid from J. A. Piper Roofing Company for the Rosman High School CTE wing roof maintenance project, subject to attorney review of the contract.

9. <u>Capital Projects Update</u>

Facilities/Transportation Director Alan Justice gave an update on the status of capital projects in the schools. He reported that requests for bids for repairs to the RHS baseball field had to be re-advertised due to receiving only two bids (three were required). New bids will be opened this week. Contractors are optimistic that they can complete the project in a timely manner. Board members were pleased to see that a number of large projects on the list have been completed. They directed the superintendent to share the capital projects update with the county manager.

Mr. Justice also reported that TCS has been awarded a second electric school bus. He added that the charging station for the first bus is ready and the bus is being built. He anticipates a big public relations rollout when the bus is delivered.

10. <u>Superintendent's Update</u>

Dr. McDaris shared the following updates:

- November is American Indian Heritage Month. North Carolina is home to eight American Indian Tribes and has the largest American Indian population in the Eastern United States. Over 17,000 American Indian Students attend North Carolina Public Schools. The North Carolina Department of Public Instruction recognizes the rich history, vibrant culture, and valuable contributions of our American Indian tribes and communities.
- NCDPI is seeking public input on K-12 Arts, Guidance and World Language standards. Stakeholder input will be used to inform revisions to the current standards. Links to the surveys are available on the DPI website. The surveys will close at 5 p.m. on November 17.
- A new cost of living report by the Virginia-based Council of Community Economic Research again puts the Asheville Metro Area as the highest in North Carolina. It confirms the increases in the cost of living by looking at housing, food, utilities, transportation and healthcare costs and comparing them to other metropolitan areas in North Carolina. Asheville tops the list.
- In 2019, the board sought additional funding from the county to fund an additional ELL (English Language Learner) teacher position in the schools. At that time we had one full-time ELL instructor and one ELL assistant for a population of 126 students. The county denied funding for the additional position. Fortunately, we were able to

use a state teacher position allocation by not filling a regular teaching position when one came open and reassigning it to an ELL position. Our ELL numbers have increased to 168 and are expected to further rise.

 On Friday, November 4, the NC Supreme Court ruled 4-3 that certain state officials must transfer funds necessary to comply with years two and three of the *Leandro* Comprehensive Remedial Plan. First, however, the Court directed the trial court to recalculate the transfer amount. The trial court previously concluded, based on funds included in the 2021 state budget, that \$785 million should be transferred to DPI, DHHS, and the UNC system. The trial court must now consider how much of that amount is already accounted for in the 2022 state budget. The Supreme Court's opinion only addresses two years of the eight-year *Leandro* Plan. We await the outcome.

Director Chris Whitlock reported that TCS received approximately \$30,00 to purchase 70 new two-way UHF radios for SROs and others. The additional radios will help increase communications coverage on school campuses with dead zones.

Dr. Brian Weaver reported that graduation dates for 2022 have been set. Davidson River School students will graduate on Thursday, June 8, at 10:00 a.m. Brevard High School's graduation will take place on Friday, June 9, at 6:00 p.m., and Rosman High School will be Saturday, June 10, at 10:00 a.m. All three commencement ceremonies will be held at the Brevard Music Center.

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Chairman McCoy welcomed school board candidates Chris Wiener, Paul Cooper, and Tanya Dalton to the meeting. She reported that the board meeting on December 19 would be scheduled as a full board training session with the school board attorneys. New board members are also encouraged to attend one of the NCSBA Core Training sessions in December. Attorney Kris Caudle noted that the NCSBA training and the local training session would be substantially different.

12. Other Items

Mr. Kiviniemi called for continued monitoring regarding the need for more English Language Learner (ELL) teachers. Dr. Weaver reported that the majority of our Multi Lingual Learner (MLL) funding comes from the state; a small portion comes from local funding. Unless more funding becomes available, we will continue to address this need through attrition of other teaching positions as possible.

Mr. Jackson reported on the recovery efforts that are underway in Fort Meyers, Florida due to recent hurricane devastation. He expressed concern that thousands of residents there are homeless and/or facing slow restoration of power and other resources.

There was no further business, and ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. DOMOKUR, the meeting was adjourned at 8:12 p.m.
