# 1. Election of Officers

Chairman McCoy turned the meeting over to Dr. McDaris, who opened the floor for nominations for board chairman. ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, Tawny McCoy was nominated as chairman for 2017. There were no other nominations, and ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the nominations were closed. BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, Tawny McCoy was elected as chairman for 2017. Dr. McDaris opened the floor for nominations for vice chair. ON A MOTION BY MRS. MCGAHA, SECONDED BY MRS. MCCOY, Ron Kiviniemi was nominated as vice chair for 2017. There were no further nominations, and ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. MCCOY, the nominations were closed. BY UNANIMOUS VOTE, Ron Kiviniemi was elected as vice chair for 2017. Dr. McDaris returned the meeting to Chairman McCoy.

# 2. Approval of Agenda

ON A MOTION BY MRS. MCCOY, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the meeting agenda for December 19, 2016 was approved as presented.

#### 3. Public Comment

Dr. McDaris recognized the student artwork from Pisgah Forest Elementary School that was on display in the board room and thanked SRO Stroup for being in attendance.

# 5. Former Students in the Military

The board reviewed the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were two new names on the list, Avery Reese and Gerald Reese.

# 6. Consent Agenda

ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. MCGAHA, the minutes of the November 21, 2016 meeting and the personnel report for December 19, 2016 (attached) were unanimously approved.

# 7. <u>Proposal for PFES Outdoor Classroom</u>

Principal Tonya Treadway, Assistant Principal Missy Ellenberger, and Lead Teacher Anne Hardy presented a proposal to build an outdoor classroom at Pisgah Forest Elementary School. The classroom would enhance STEM achievement through handson learning, generate stewardship of the natural world, and boost community involvement. Go Green Builders has volunteered all design and labor for the project, and the PFES Ranger Organization of Parents and Educators (ROPE) is raising money for the building materials. A wide range of community organizations have offered teaching resources, lessons and teacher training. The school also plans to establish a native garden near the outdoor classroom. The garden would facilitate lessons on life cycles, animal migration and adaptions, and be registered as a national Monarch Butterfly Way Station. Mrs. Treadway requested board approval to move forward with the outdoor classroom.

Policy DJ-R, Purchasing Requirements, states that capital projects with an estimated value of \$10,000 or more (including the value of donation of materials and volunteer labor) and funded by individual school funds (including boosters, alumni, and other supporting organizations) must have prior approval of the superintendent and the board of education before entering into any contracts or agreements with any vendor, contractor, or volunteer.

Attorney Donnahoo asked about ADA compliance and recommended having a memorandum of understanding between ROPE, the school system, and Go Green Builders. Mrs. Treadway reported that the architect has planned for handicap accessibility from either the school track or the main building. Norris Barger recommended that he and Mr. Donnahoo work on the MOU and insurance issues. He noted that ADA compliance would be a necessary requirement of any building permit.

Board members were appreciative of the opportunities for learning that the classroom represents and for the support of parents and the local business community in pursuing the project. Dr. McDaris thanked the board for considering an expedited approval, noting that PFES would like to start the project as soon as possible in order to take advantage of the builder's slow season. Mrs. McGaha asked whether the school would have all of the money in hand before the project starts. Mrs. Treadway reported that they have enough to get started, approximately \$2,000. She estimated the total cost of materials would be \$10,000 before discounts. Mr. Donnahoo reported that, should the ROPE organization fail to raise the total amount needed for the project, the board would be required to pay for the remainder out of its budget. ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MRS. MCGAHA, the board unanimously approved the PFES outdoor classroom project pending the school obtaining the necessary funds for materials.

# 8. <u>School Improvement Plans 2016-2018</u>

Dr. Jeremy Gibbs presented the school improvement plans for 2016-2018. He gave a reminder that the plans represent instructional components only; school safety plans will be presented to the board in a future closed session. Principals and school improvement team members were on hand to answer questions from board members. Board members commended the plans' inclusion of strategies to increase parent and community partnerships, good use of data, greater levels of parental participation, improved readability and reduction of jargon, and establishment of high goals. Mr. Kiviniemi asked about feedback to see which goals were accomplished. Dr. Gibbs reported that the board would receive an update a year from now to evaluate progress and another update at the end of two years. ON A MOTION BY MRS. MCGAHA,

SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the nine school improvement plans for 2016-2018 were unanimously approved. The board thanked everyone for all their hard work on the plans.

# 9. Policy

Dr. McDaris reported that the Department of Public Instruction (DPI) had recently established a new requirement for LEAs to have board-adopted policies in place to ensure comparability of Title I services among schools. To assist local boards in meeting this requirement, NCSBA prepared a sample policy for local boards to consider. Due to the extremely short deadline established by DPI, board attorneys recommended that the sample policy be adopted as soon as possible to help avoid any question of compliance and ensure that future policy revisions keep districts up to date. Brian Weaver presented new policy 3565/8307, Title I Program Comparability of Services, as first-read information. He reported that the policy puts into writing procedures that were already in place regarding Title I services. There were no questions, and ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the board unanimously waived a second reading and adopted policy 3565/8307 as presented.

# 10. Topics for Work Session

The board will hold its annual planning work session on Monday, February 6, 2017 at the Morris Education Center beginning at 5:30 p.m. A light supper will be provided. Dr. McDaris reported that possible topics include FY18 budget, master facilities plan, capital, technology, and social media. Board members requested an update on student growth by quartile and an update on high school scheduling for next year. Dr. McDaris invited members to send him any other suggestions for the work session.

# 11. <u>Superintendent's Update</u>

Dr. McDaris gave the following updates:

- The General Assembly convened last week for a special session to address Hurricane Matthew relief efforts for eastern North Carolina. After that session ended, another called session was held during which several bills were passed. One of the bills, HB17, changes the makeup of the State Board of Elections, State Ethics Commission, and county boards of elections to be equally divided by party. The previous law gave the majority of seats to the governor's party. The bill also limits some of the governor's powers, including appointments, and takes away some power from the State Board of Education and transfers it to the newly elected State Superintendent. The legislature may convene another special session to address HB2.
- Approximately 20 other bills were filed addressing multiple topics, including potential changes to school calendar law, but those bills did not pass and/or make it past the Senate.
- The Annual A. Mickey Church Math/Science Fair will be held January 30 through February 2, 2017 at the county library. The exhibits and demonstrations will begin at 6:00 p.m. on February 2 in the Rogow Room. Board members are invited to join the judges' lunch on January 31.
- A former classmate of the superintendent and alumnus of Brevard High School and North Carolina State University, Ernie Silva, has established a scholarship at NCSU in honor of his mother, Ann Price Silva. The scholarship is targeted at students in our region who are interested in pursuing an engineering degree at NC State.
- The Department of Justice program that was held at Brevard High School focused primarily on concerns related to student voice. The top concerns identified by students were Smart Lunch and scheduling. Dr. McDaris noted that neither the

sheriff nor the police chief have received a report yet regarding the DOJ's purpose for scheduling the workshops.
