Governor Visits Brevard High School

On April 11, Governor Roy Cooper visited Brevard High School for an informative and interactive morning. While at the school, Governor Cooper held a roundtable discussion with teachers to hear their concerns and ideas for how the state can better serve public education, toured classrooms and talked with students, and answered questions from local media. Brevard High School was honored to have been selected by the Governor's office to host a visit, and the event was a great experience for everyone involved.

BHS Band Earns Gold at Carnegie Hall

On April 2, members of the Brevard High School band had a once-in-a lifetime experience performing in the 2019 New York Invitational Music Festival at Carnegie Hall in New York. The group performed "Inferno" and "Ascension" from Robert W. Smith's *First Symphony,* based on Dante Alighieri's epic poem, "The Divine Comedy." On March 20, the band had earned a Superior rating with this program at the state Music Performance Assessment (MPA). Within days, they had retooled and refreshed and packed for New York, where they earned top marks again with a Gold Award at Carnegie Hall. Director Jim Leatherwood and band members Sarah Megown and Clint Harron spoke to the board about their remarkable experience and thanked everyone who helped to make it a reality.

The public will have a chance to hear the band perform in two concerts this month. The first will be the BHS spring band concert on Thursday, May 23, at 7:00 p.m. in the Brevard High School auditorium. Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for students. The second opportunity will be a fundraiser concert on Wednesday, May 29, at 7:30 p.m. at the Pilot Cove Amphitheater in Pisgah Forest. Tickets for this event are \$20, which includes admission and one entry into a raffle for two tickets to see Paul McCartney in Greenville on Thursday, May 30. Parking will be available in the upper lot at The Hub and Pisgah Tavern, and a shuttle bus will provide transport to and from the amphitheater. Tickets may be purchased at Highland Books and the Cup & Saucer in Brevard.

The board reviewed the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were no new names on the list. Mr. Griffin reported that he has spoken with the VFW about getting MIA flags for the schools.

5. <u>Consent Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the board unanimously approved the minutes of the April 8 and April 25, 2019 meetings and the personnel report for May 6, 2019 (attached).

6. <u>Federal Programs: Notice of Intent to Apply</u>

Dr. Brian Weaver reported that Transylvania County Schools has given public notice of the following applications for federal grants that have been or will be submitted within the next 30 days. He reported that most of the federal funding is for positions, and because many grants are only partially funded, monies from several sources are often combined to fund a full position. No major changes in the grant amounts are expected for next year.

7. FY20 Budget

On April 25, the board approved budget requests for the local current expense fund, capital outlay fund, restricted grants fund, and child nutrition allocation for the 2019-2020 fiscal year. Norris Barger reported that there is now a House budget in addition to the Governor's proposal; the Senate budget is still being developed. Board members discussed JROTC funding and federal grants funding. Mr. Barger explained that federal grant funds may only be used to supplement, not supplant. This means that if a grant is awarded for something we pay for with local funds, we cannot use the federal money in place of the local expenditure.

8. Flooring Contract Approval

Norris Barger presented pricing for new carpeting at Brevard Middle School and Rosman Elementary School. Board policy 6430 requires all contracts over \$90,000 to be approved by the board. The policy also allows an exception from the bidding process for competitive group purchasing. Young Office Environments has priced carpet at both locations using the Sourcewell competitive group purchasing cooperative. Flooring for Brevard Middle is priced at \$151,075.31 and for Rosman Elementary at \$93,577.22. Both projects are split funded over FY19 and FY20, with total projected budgets of \$156,000 and \$94,000 respectively, including contingency. Mr. Barger noted that Young has been low bidder on the previous three flooring projects. Dr. McDaris recommended approval of the bids. Mr. Griffin asked about carpet life expectancy. Mr. Barger reported that the typical life of classroom carpeting is 7-8 years; our carpets usually have to last about 15 years. He explained the new carpeting will be modular, which allows for easy replacement of damaged squares and extends the overall life. Mr. Barger described how group purchasing cooperatives can increase purchasing power for school systems, municipalities, and other agencies. ON A MOTION BY MR, GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. DOMOKUR, the board unanimously approved the flooring bids from Young Office Environments in the amounts of \$151,075.31 for Brevard Middle School and \$93,577.22 for Rosman Elementary School.

9. <u>Superintendent's Update</u>

Dr. McDaris reported the following items:

The Department of Justice has given the go-ahead to IBM's \$34 billion takeover of Raleigh-based Red Hat. Red Hat will be IBM's biggest-ever acquisition when it closes, and one that analysts have said will help the computer giant compete with younger tech companies--such as Amazon, Microsoft and Google--in the cloud computing space. IBM plans to keep the company as an independent unit. IBM has a campus in the Research Triangle Park, and Red Hat is located in downtown Raleigh. Red Hat employs 2,000 people in Raleigh alone and over 12,000 worldwide. This is another example of the effects of urban draw and the employment challenges for rural North Carolina.

- According to research by Dr. Matthew Lynch, a noted educator, author, and futurist with TechEdvocate, our society's collective body of knowledge is doubling at a rate of every twelve months, and that number will narrow to every twelve hours before we reach technological singularity. Because schools are in the knowledge business, there are some far-reaching implications for what and how schools teach. Already it has become impossible to teach everything we know in twelve scant years. Our instructional focus must be on *who* we want our children to become instead of *what* we want them to know. Students can look up the knowledge they need; we must teach them how to think and solve problems. Dr. Peter Diamandis, an engineer, physician, entrepreneur and contributor to Lynch's research, suggests that elementary schools revise what they teach to have modern focus on (a) building communication skills, (b) identifying passion, (c) encouraging curiosity, (d) developing perseverance, (e) mastering technology, and (f) practicing empathy and ethics.

11. <u>Timeline for Superintendent's Annual Evaluation</u>

Dr. McDaris reported that policy 7805, Superintendent Evaluation, gives the board the responsibility to maintain and improve the quality of the administrative leadership of the school system. The primary method used to carry out this responsibility is to assist the superintendent in improving his or her effectiveness through an annual evaluation. The board reviewed the recommended timeline the 2018-2019 evaluation process:

June 17 - Superintendent provides self-assessment to the board. Board members receive individual copies of the evaluation instrument. *Before July 15* - Board chair and vice chair meet with superintendent to discuss self-assessment. Board members complete and return individual evaluations to board chair or vice chair.

July 15 - Board members meet in closed session to prepare consensus evaluation.

August 19 - Board meets with superintendent in closed session to discuss the consensus evaluation and agree upon performance goals and recommendations for the new school year.

12. <u>Reports from Board Training Event</u>

On April 30 and May 1, Courtney Domokur attended the NCSBA Public Policy Conference in Raleigh. Mrs. Domokur reported that the conference was very informative. Leanne Winner gave an update on the status of pending bills, and attendees had an opportunity to meet with House members and Senators. There was a session on strategic planning that emphasized bringing in business and community partners to develop ten-year plans. Another session focused on school safety, with a presentation on school shootings and how things have changed since Columbine.
