The Transylvania County Board of Education met in regular session at 6:30 p.m. on May 20, 2013 at the Morris Education Center. Members Tawny McCoy, Chair; Sue Fox; Ron Kiviniemi and Mike Rogers were in attendance. Also present were Dr. Jeff McDaris, Superintendent; Jenny Hunter, Administrative Assistant; Norris Barger, Director of Business Services; Dr. Scott Elliott, Assistant Superintendent; School Resource Officer B.J. Owens; Jeremiah Reed, *Transylvania Times;* and two guests. Mr. Kiviniemi led in a moment of silence and Mrs. Fox led the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman McCoy welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order. She reported that Vice Chairman Petit was absent due to a family-related event.

ON A MOTION BY MRS. FOX, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the meeting agenda for May 20, 2013 was approved as presented.

# 3. <u>Good News Report</u>

Dr. McDaris reported the following items:

#### AFTER-PROM LOCK-IN SETS RECORD ATTENDANCE

The annual Rosman High School after-prom lock-in set a new attendance record this year, with 181 students and 32 chaperones attending the all night event held in the

Boshamer Gym at Brevard College. Organized by School Resource Officer Greg Stroup and teacher Julie Queen, the lock-in provides a positive alternative to dangerous decisions on prom night. The evening offered activities, games, food, DVDs, and drawings for prizes. Students consumed eight pounds of candy, 45 Jets' pizzas, 200 biscuits from McDonald's and 26 cases of drinks. They also played basketball, dodgeball, ping-pong, pool, Wii games, and watched three movies. Some even managed to get a little sleep. Every student received a t-shirt and a door prize, and five lucky students won drawings for a mini-fridge, a Garmin GPS, a TV, a tablet, and tickets to the Blue Man Group. Senior Kaitlyn Owen took home the big prize of the night, a kayak. Over \$6,000 in funding and prizes were donated by local businesses, organizations and individuals. Over the last 12 years, nearly 2000 students have attended the after-prom lock-ins.

#### RHS BLOOD DRIVE

The Rosman High School blood drive on May 13 collected 71 units of blood for the Transylvania Red Cross, with 40 donors signed up. Teacher Tammy Moman was thrilled with the turnout, and the Red Cross staff staid, "This is the best school we have been to all week-these country students are awesome."

## 4. Former Students in the Military

The Board read aloud the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were four new names on the list: Campbell Aspray, Gavin Bingham, Lindsey Henson, and Josh Worley.

## 5. <u>Consent Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MR. ROGERS, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the minutes from the April 30, May 6, and May 7, 2013 meetings and the personnel report for May 20, 2013 (see attached) were unanimously approved.

#### 6. <u>AIG Plan for 2013-2016</u>

At the May 6 meeting, Director Cathy Childress and AIG specialists presented the Academically Intellectually Gifted (AIG) Plan for 2013-2016. Dr. McDaris asked if there

were any questions about the plan. Mrs. Fox commended the plan and the presentation. Mr. Kiviniemi also commended the plan, and added that he would like to see any available funds be used to try and improve AIG staffing ratios. Mr. Rogers commended the plan and asked about the numbers of AIG students in TCS. Dr. McDaris reported that the state allots AIG funds based on how many AIG students they believe each district should have as a percentage of overall student population. Transylvania County has always exceeded the state calculations in the numbers of AIG students identified and served. Mr. Rogers whether an AIG student could choose to leave the program. Dr. McDaris replied that an AIG student could opt out of the program. AIG students are held to higher standards in terms of performance, and a student who is underperforming would be given encouragement and individualized exercises based on their individual talents. Mr. Rogers asked about using computers for AIG instruction. Dr. Scott Elliott reported that TCS teachers use Moodle as the platform for developing instructional plans and incorporate online resources. Computers also help teachers to provide more differentiated instruction. Board members recalled seeing DRS teacher Philip Fisher teach three different math lessons in one class using computerized instruction. Mr. Rogers related how new software has changed the way in which plans and blueprints and plans are utilized in the masonry industry. He stated that he was glad to know that similar applications are being used in the schools. Dr. Elliott reported that the Board would receive an update on instructional services this summer that would highlight the new Home Base online tool for teachers. Dr. McDaris noted that our teachers are using all manner of technology for instruction and staying abreast of current trends. He noted that several teachers have expressed interest in having classroom discussion via Twitter. ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MRS. FOX, the Academically Intellectually Gifted Plan for 2013-2016 was unanimously approved.

# 7. Bids for BMS Bus Re-Routing

Norris Barger reported that three bids for the Brevard Middle School bus traffic re-routing project were received on May 6:

Mr. Barger explained that the base bid includes the front drive and option 1 includes the rear bus lane/parking improvements. He reported that after consultation with the engineer, T. E. Allen, and the low bidder, Mountain Excavating, changes were made to the option 1 plans that reduced the total bid to \$198,812.53. The budget for the project is \$150,000. Additional funding of \$50,000 is available from the capital repairs line item for FY13. He recommended that Mountain Excavating, LLC, be awarded the project at the revised bid price and that \$50,000 be used from the FY13 capital repairs line item.

Board members asked about the tree that the school wanted to save. Mr. Barger reported that both the tree and the island would remain in place. Mr. Rogers asked where this project was on the BMS priority list. Mr. Barger reported that this was a top

priority. All were in agreement that the new traffic pattern would greatly improve traffic flow and student safety. Mr. Barger would expect work to begin as soon as school lets out for the summer and to be completed before school begins in August. ON A MOTION BY MR. ROGERS, SECONDED BY MRS. FOX, the Board unanimously awarded the Brevard Middle School bus traffic rerouting project to Mountain Excavating, LLC, for a base bid and revised option 1 total of \$198,812.53 and approved the appropriation of \$50,000 from the FY13 capital repairs line item to fund the project.

## 8. FY14 Budget

Mr. Barger and Dr. McDaris gave an update on the latest budget news from Raleigh. They reported that the just-released Senate budget proposal contains several items of concern including cuts to teacher positions, elimination of class size caps in grades K-3, cuts to instructional support, cuts to teacher assistant positions, removing the discretionary cuts, and the elimination of additional pay for educators earning advanced degrees such as masters and doctorates. The Senate proposal also has a zero cost-ofliving increase for teachers and state employees. The House budget proposal has not yet been released. Mr. Kiviniemi stated that adoption of the Senate budget proposal would be disastrous for public education and suggested sending a letter to Senator Tom Apodoca expressing the Board's concerns. Mr. Barger explained that it would be better for TCS if the state leaves the discretionary cut alone because otherwise that money is removed all together. He stated that with the discretionary cut in place, he is at least able to leverage the state funding received as needed. After some discussion, ON A MOTION BY MR. KINIVIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. ROGERS, the Board authorized the Superintendent to draft a letter/resolution to Senator Tom Apodoca expressing the Board's concerns regarding the Senate budget proposal.

Dr. McDaris gave a recap from the May 14 joint meeting, noting that he and the county manager seem to be in agreement on the school system's operational request of \$509,333. Where they differ is the amount of capital funding. The Board of Education has requested \$1.8 million and the county manager has proposed \$1.6 million. Dr. McDaris reported that the county manager would like the Board's consideration of a two-year capital budget appropriation. Dr. McDaris stated that he believes this proposal could work well for the school system if the commissioners would agree to lock in at the \$1.8 million level for two years.

Mr. Kiviniemi stated that he would be comfortable with a two-year lock at \$1.8 million provided that the two Boards start investigating a way to meet the infrastructure needs of the schools. Dr. McDaris reported that Transylvania County used to average bond referendums for school improvements every 10 years. The last school bond referendum was done in 1998.

Mrs. Fox expressed her agreement with a two-year proposal at \$1.8 million, stating that a two-year budget would it make it easier to plan.

Chairman McCoy relayed that Mrs. Petit had expressed concerns about having a set amount for two years, and feels there should be a caveat that if the Board has a major emergency need during that time, they would be allowed to come to the County for funding assistance over and above the agreed upon amount.

Mr. Rogers stated that he could accept capital funding at \$1.8 million for two years provided that a shared agreement is in place between the two Boards that the County would agree to provide additional funding in the event of an emergency repair situation

such as the one that occurred with the Brevard High School stadium several years ago. He stated that he also agrees with starting a discussion regarding bonds. He feels that the only way the school system can address its overwhelming facility needs is through a bond referendum. Mr. Barger agreed with this assessment, commenting, "We are only plugging the dike."

Mr. Barger gave a summary of the process followed with the 1998 bond issue. As a first step, the Board in 1996 hired architectural firm Padgett & Freeman to develop a master facilities plan for the entire school district. The plan totaled nearly \$50 million and was later whittled down to \$27 million of the most pressing needs. The Board of Education worked with the Board of Commissioners to develop an agreed-upon amount and to identify specific projects to be included in the bond project. The list included improvements for each of the nine schools. Along with Padgett & Freeman, the firm of Architectural Design Studio (ADS) was hired and each firm worked on designated portions of the plan. A marketing campaign to build support for the bond referendum was developed and put into place. The campaign included, but was not limited to, public forums at schools and community centers to present information and answer questions, newspaper articles and advertisements, radio spots, billboards, petitions of support, and speaking to civic and other organizations explaining exactly what the bond would provide and why it was needed. All of this effort was rewarded when the bond referendum was overwhelmingly passed by the citizens of the county. Mr. Barger noted that the fact that state bond money was available at the same time was a plus.

Mr. Rogers asked whether the Board should consider bringing in a security expert to provide a plan on school safety. Mr. Barger stated that an architectural firm would typically call upon the expertise of others, including security experts if the Board so desires. All agreed that there should be one master plan incorporating all components rather than multiple, possibly conflicting, plans. Mr. Barger reported that the firms of Padgett Freeman and Architectural Design Studio (ADS) have each provided excellent service in the past, and the Board may choose to go with one or more familiar firms or put out Requests for Proposals. He explained that the entire process from beginning to end could take a year and a half to two years.

Mr. Rogers clarified that in terms of security the Board has clearly identified the projects needed for the present, and emphasized that he is 100 percent in favor of moving the BES front office. He noted that a bond issue would be focused on long-term improvements. Mrs. McCoy gave a reminder that for safety reasons, many of the details related to school security plans must remain confidential.

ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. ROGERS, the Board voted unanimously to accept a recommendation for two-year capital outlay appropriation of \$1,800,000 with the exception of major emergency repairs and to begin exploring ways to fund long-term capital needs, including the possibility of a bond referendum.

Chairman McCoy made a clarification regarding current expense funding. She stated that at the joint meeting, it may have appeared that the Board had accepted the potential draw of funds from its current expense fund balance over the next few years as a recommended funding plan. She clarified that this is not the Board's plan or desire, but merely an acknowledgement of a potential path that the Board may be faced with if the funding situation does not improve. She directed Mr. Barger and Dr. McDaris to relay this clarification to the county manager as well as the Board's discussion regarding capital funding.
