1. Approval of Agenda

3. Good News Report

Dr. McDaris reported the following items:

BHS TENNIS TEAM

Congratulations to the Brevard High School Tennis Team for an outstanding season, winning the Western North Carolina Athletic Conference Championship and second place in the State Championships.

BHS CUSTODIAL TEAM HONORED

At its meeting on May 19, the Transylvania County Retired School Personnel Association honored Brevard High School custodians Anna Brown, Stella Fairchild, Tony Lance, Al Merrill, Ray Meyers, and Steve Tilson. This excerpt from a letter written by retired teacher Susan Bir says it all:

"Many of us have spent a great deal of time at Brevard High School and have seen a school that should be looking quite worn and used-up appear to be just the opposite. Floors sparkle and classrooms look ready for any of the fussiest inspectors. We appreciate that, but that is really not why we invited these hard working professionals to our meeting. We run the Kimzey-Tilson Supply Closet. Part of our work is transporting large boxes of heavy and awkward classroom supplies such as paper towels, reams of copy paper, cartons of hand sanitizer, etc., from our cars, into the school, down the hallways, and into our closet. Twice a month, some of those same supplies must be packed up and transported to our county's teachers. Often we have needed help from these six custodians. And too often we must interrupt their work. Always, they immediately stop what they are doing and focus on our needs. Cheerfully, as if our work is more important than theirs, each of them solves our problem and takes time to interact with us. We have heard wonderful things about this team. However, we know firsthand that they are the best. We thought you would like to know our experiences with this star- studded crew."

PFES PRINCIPAL COMPLETES NCPAPA LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Merriman Nichols, Principal of Pisgah Forest Elementary School, recently completed the Distinguished Leadership in Practice (DLP) program provided by the North Carolina Principals and Assistant Principals Association (NCPAPA) in partnership with the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction. The DLP program is a rigorous year-long development program for practicing school principals that is aligned to the performance evaluation standards adopted by the State Board of Education. Principals engage in a series of activities through the year that are designed to build the capacity of their

schools and their own capacity as leaders, and attend face-to-face sessions once every other month while accessing online materials, assignments and coaching in between sessions. Congratulations to Ms. Nichols for her achievement.

Dr. McDaris thanked SRO Owens for being in attendance.

4. Recognition of Retirees 2015-2016

Each June, the board recognizes the employees of Transylvania County Schools who have retired or will be retiring during the current school year. Dr. McDaris reported that some of those being recognized have spent their entire careers with the Transylvania County Schools, and some have worked in other school districts in addition to Transylvania. The 13 individuals being honored in 2015-2016 represent a combined total of 347 years of service. The board members and Dr. McDaris presented engraved crystal apples and their thanks, commendations and congratulations to the persons named below in grateful appreciation for their years of dedicated service to public education and the students of Transylvania County Schools.

Following the recognitions, the board went into recess at 6:45 p.m. for a brief reception in honor of the retirees. The meeting resumed at 7:05 p.m.

5. Former Students in the Military

The board reviewed the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were no new names on the list. Dr. McDaris gave a reminder that this was the anniversary of D-Day on June 6, 1944, when Allied forces landed on the beaches of Normandy, France during World War II.

6. Consent Agenda

ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. SCRUGGS, the minutes of the May 16, 2016 meeting were unanimously approved.

7. CTE Plan 2016-2017

At the May 16 meeting, Arleca Chapman presented the Career and Technical Education (CTE) Plan for 2016-2017. Ms. Chapman addressed questions from the board. Mrs. Scruggs asked if there was anything in the state curriculum that could allow more students to take upper level health-related courses. Ms. Chapman reported that the state sets a limit of 10 students per course. She added there is also a limited number of places that will accept students for clinicals. Ms. Chapman reported that Tammy Moman at Brevard High School has offered to give up her planning period in order to teacher another class of nursing fundamentals. Both high schools strive to maximize the number of students who can get certifications, even offering transportation for a student who wants to attend a class at the other high school. Mr. Griffin asked how many students have to be turned away due to class size limits. Ms. Chapman reported that this year it was seven students. Mrs. Scruggs reported that she had attended the FFA banquet and was impressed by the students' leadership skills. She commented on how closely FFA courses are aligned with the sciences. There was no further discussion, and ON A MOTION BY MRS. SCRUGGS, SECONDED BY MRS. PETIT, the Career/Technical Education plan for 2016-2017 was unanimously approved.

8. Student Handbooks 2016-2017

Audrey Reneau and Brian Weaver presented the changes to the student handbooks for the 2016-2017 school year. They reported that there would be a large number of changes to the 2017-2018 handbooks based on the new student policies that will be adopted over the coming year.

9. Safe Schools / Transportation Update

Alan Justice gave an overview of school safety, transportation, and athletics for the 2015-2016 school year:

- Transylvania County Schools had 30 reportable offenses in the 2014-2015 Consolidated Data Report on Crime/Suspensions/Dropouts. Mr. Justice explained that this number is not a true indicator of the safety of our school system. He emphasized that TCS schools take safety very seriously and are diligent in reporting all offenses. Some districts do not report all offenses. Mr. Justice gave as an example that the Charlotte Mecklenburg district led the state last year in serious assaults, yet they self-reported fewer incidents than Transylvania. Mr. Justice noted that three quarters of the incidents of possession in Transylvania last year were reported by other students.
- Transylvania School Resource Officers made 2500 student contacts during the year and over 1200 parent contacts. The SROs taught 408 classes—something that is unique to Transylvania County. The SROs also worked 309 school sporting events in addition to their community work with coaching, Little League, Boy Scouts, and other organizations. Mr. Justice emphasized how fortunate our county is to have SROs in all schools.
- School DVRs are being updated to allow access online or through phone apps for increased safety and security.

• Mr. Justice commended TCS school bus drivers and mechanics for another great year. He reported that 1676 students rode TCS buses this year.

- Transylvania has been chosen as one of 13 counties to pilot safety belts in some of
 its buses next year. Drivers will be trained over the summer. Students riding buses
 that are equipped with safety belts will be required to wear the belts in order to ride.
- Transylvania County Schools has obtained a \$98,000 grant to replace old bus mufflers with diesel particulate filters.
- The extended stop arms that were piloted on five buses this year have been a big success. Mr. Justice hopes that the state will fund extended stop arms for all buses.
- Five more stop arm cameras have been installed. Mr. Justice would like to have them on all yellow buses by 2018.
- GPS tracking will be installed on yellow buses this year and also some activity buses.
 This will allow crews to pinpoint exact locations in the event of a bus accident or breakdown.
- Mr. Justice is working on a plan to better track damage to activity buses. Some employees in the past have turned in buses without reporting minor accidents.
- Congratulations to the RHS relay team, BHS tennis, and Brevard and Rosman track programs track for great seasons.
- There were three positive results this year during random student drug testing. Last year there were eight positives.

Mrs. Scruggs stated that the DARE graduations earlier that day reinforced how the SROs build relationships, instill values, and help students make positive decisions. She expressed appreciation to the schools, administration, sheriff's department and the county commissioners for their support of the school resource officer program. Chairman McCoy echoed Mrs. Scruggs remarks, pointing out that schools are about providing education for life, and the SROs help teach life lessons.

Mr. Griffin commended all of the student athletes for their participation and positive conduct at games. Dr. McDaris commended our student athletes for their tenacity and thanked Mr. and Mrs. Patton for their efforts on behalf of the Brevard College track. He reported that soon our high schools will have a place to practice field events. Mr. Justice commended the school system's strong coaching staff, reporting that both high schools do an excellent job finding coaches who bring out the best in students.

10. Superintendent's Update

Dr. McDaris reported the following items:

 The Senate budget is out. The budget now goes to conferees in both chambers to work out a unified agreement to send to the Governor. The House and Senate budgets are very different.

HB 632, Student Online Protection Act, cleared its final legislative hurdle when the
House voted to concur with the Senate's version. The bill prevents third-party
vendors who contract with public schools from either (1) releasing personallyidentifying student data to other corporations, or (2) using that data for targeted
advertising. The bill awaits the Governor's signature.

- HB 242, Charter School Law Changes (formerly titled "White Collar Investigation").
 Senate sponsors made various changes to laws governing charter schools in this not-yet-publicly-posted bill. HB 242 directs the State Board of Education to review a charter school's operations once every 10 years (as opposed to the current 5 years).
- HB 1080, Achievement School District, passed the House by an eleven-vote margin (60-49) and now goes to the Senate.
- The Teacher Working Conditions Survey is out. Early analysis shows several statewide trends: (1) Teachers have declining confidence in how accurately state tests are gauging students' understanding of the material; (2) Teachers cited principals and other leaders at their school as the most important factor when deciding whether they want to keep teaching at their current school; (3) Teachers cited use of time and instructional practices and support as the second most important factors in whether they stay at their school; (4) About 65% of teachers say an effort has been made to minimize the amount of routine paperwork they have to do, compared with 57% in 2014; and (5) A greater proportion of educators agree that state assessment data are available in time to impact instruction as compared to 2014.

11. Important Dates
