The Transylvania County Board of Education met in regular session at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, June 21, 2021 at the Morris Education Center. Marty Griffin led in a moment of silence and Courtney Domokur led the Pledge of Allegiance. Chairman McCoy welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order. 1. <u>Approval of Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MRS. DOMOKUR, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the meeting agenda for June 21, 2021 was unanimously approved.

2. <u>Public Comment</u>

None

3. <u>Good News Report</u>

Dr. McDaris reported the following:

PFES Preschool

We are very excited about our newest Pre-K classroom, the Ranger Station at Pisgah Forest Elementary School. We have 18 children currently enrolled and are looking forward to the youngest Rangers, ages 3 and 4, attending Transylvania County Schools. The addition of the PFES preschool makes Transylvania a PK-12 district with a preschool classroom in each of our four elementary schools. We see this as a partnership with our families in laying a firm foundation for learning now and in the future.

Dr. McDaris thanked Officer Hall for attending the meeting.

4. Former Students in the Military

The board recognized the list of former students from Brevard High School, Rosman High School, and Davidson River School who are currently serving or have previously served in the U.S. Military. There were no new names on the list.

5. <u>Consent Agenda</u>

ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. KIVINIEMI, the minutes of the June 7, 2021 meeting, the June 7, 2021 closed session, and the personnel report for June 21, 2021 (attached) were unanimously approved.

6. <u>Request for Authorization of School Trip</u>

Brevard High School theater arts teacher Candice Burchill reported that the BHS theater department has been selected to perform at the American High School Theatre Festival (AHSTF) as part of the famed Edinburgh Festival Fringe in Scotland in August 2022. Invitations to apply for AHSTF are extended to programs that have been nominated by state, regional, and national theater organizations from across the country–being selected is a great honor. The Fringe features artists and performers in theater, comedy, dance, physical theater, circus, cabaret, children's shows, musicals, opera, spoken word, exhibitions and events. In addition to four performance dates at the Fringe, students will get to experience two nights in London and 10 nights in Edinburgh, including a show and workshop at the Globe and West End theaters, an event at Edinburgh Castle, a Scottish dance class, sightseeing, and more. Trips outside of the continental United States must be approved by the board upon recommendation by the superintendent. Dr. McDaris reported that he has discussed the plans with Mrs. Burchill and recommends that the board approve the trip.

Mrs. Burchill reported that the trip would involve 15 students and two chaperones. Attendees will be selected from an audition. The cost will be \$6,500 per student which includes airfare, accommodations, transportation, security, onsite doctors, and two meals a day. Grants, scholarship opportunities, and fundraisers are being planned to help students pay for the trip, and ability to pay will not prevent a student from participating. Board members congratulated Mrs. Burchill and the theater students for being selected for this exciting opportunity. Mr. Jackson extended an invitation for the group to come and give a report to the board after they get back.

Attorney Kris Caudle discussed waivers of liability, parental consent forms, and other requirements per board policy and recommended that board approval be contingent upon review and approval of the travel contract and other documents by the board

attorney. Mrs. Burchill stated that she will forward the documents for review. She noted that the decision is time sensitive because the package involves an advance visit by the teacher in order to view accommodations, etc. The advance trip, which Mrs. Burchill would take this summer, requires a deposit. ON A MOTION BY MR. KIVINIEMI, SECONDED BY MR. GRIFFIN, the board unanimously approved the superintendent's recommendation to approve the Brevard High School theater students' trip to Edinburgh, Scotland in August 2022 with the caveat that the travel contract and other necessary documents be vetted and approved by the board attorney and that the requirements of policy 3320 and regulations 3320-R (School Trips) be met.

7. <u>CTE Plan 2021-2022</u>

On June 7, Missy Ellenberger presented the Career and Technical Education (CTE) plan for 2021-2022 as first-read information. She has since been informed that the new CTE data will not be available from the state until this fall. The plan will be populated with the new data at that time. She addressed questions from board members regarding fifth grade career exploration, performance indicators, state benchmarks, and funding of CTE positions. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. JACKSON, the Career and Technical Education Plan for 2021-2022 was unanimously approved.

8. <u>Social-Emotional Learning & School Mental Health Plan</u>

On November 5, 2020, the State Board of Education adopted the School-Based Mental Health Initiative that requires each LEA to adopt and implement a plan for promoting student mental health and well-being by July 1, 2021. Missy Ellenberger presented an outline of the Transylvania County Schools Social Emotional Learning (SEL) and Mental Health Plan for 2021-2022. The actual SEL Improvement Plan will be a living document to be reviewed/updated at each team meeting and updated quarterly based on data. Mr. Kiviniemi asked if the state has provided any funding to pay for services or hire mental health professionals. Mrs. Ellenberger reported that federal ESSER funds will be used to hire two new school counselors. She reviewed SEL training schedules for teachers and staff for the coming year. The full plan will be published on the district website and filed with the Department of Public Instruction. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MR. JACKSON, the Transylvania County School Social-Emotional Learning and Mental Health Plan for 2021-2022 was unanimously approved.

9. Policy: Spring 2021 Custom Updates

Dr. Brian Weaver presented as first-read information 46 revised polices from the NCSBA Spring 2021 Custom Policy Updates and one revised policy (2310, Public Participation at Meetings) from our board attorneys. One policy (1610/7800, Professional and Staff Development) reflects an impending deadline for a school-based mental health plan (see item no. 8 above). Other policies contain only minor changes such as updates to legal references, statutes that have been recodified, new hyperlinks, and updated terminology. A few are related to the COVID-19 response, and some contain changes from our board attorneys in addition to the NCSBA changes. There were no new policies. Chairman McCoy noted that two board members would miss the July 19 meeting due to family vacations; therefore, she recommended that second-read approval of the policies be postponed until the August 2 meeting. There were no objections.

Mr. Griffin had several questions and comments regarding policy 1310/4002, Parental Involvement, and requested more information on student rights.

Mr. Jackson asked if the NC School Boards Association is a legislative body and what authority it has. Dr. McDaris explained that the NCSBA is a professional organization

comprised of all member school boards in North Carolina. It works with school board attorneys in developing policies for local boards based on federal and state law. It is governed by a board of directors comprised of representative school board members from across the state. It provides insurance policies and risk management services for public school districts. Its governmental relations staff monitors and lobbies the state legislature as the unified voice for all 115 NC school districts. It provides training and resources for school board members, superintendent search services, and other support services.

Mr. Jackson asked what happens if a board does not accept the NCSBA's policy recommendations. Dr. Weaver reported that some policy updates are suggested and some are highly recommended. Some we may choose not to adopt because they may not be applicable to our system. When staff receive the spring and fall updates from NCSBA, we also receive updates that our attorneys recommend to their client systems. We review both sets of recommendations and present to the board the most appropriate updates for our school system.

Mr. Jackson asked if the North Carolina High School Athletic Association (NCHSAA) is a legislative body. Dr. McDaris explained that the NCHSAA is not a legislative body. School districts do not have to be NCHSAA members, but districts that are not members do not have anyone to play. The NCHSAA has an executive director and governing board comprised of principals, athletic directors, assistant superintendents, some superintendents, and coaches. Its overall function is to govern athletic eligibility and align districts to ensure fair competitions. Dr. McDaris remarked that Transylvania did well in the recent NCHSAA realignment. Our student athletes should see reduced travel time and less instructional time missed during the school day.

Mr. Jackson asked if the NC Department of Public Instruction (DPI) is mandated by the state legislature. Dr. McDaris explained that DPI has authority over school curriculum and programs. They answer to the State Board of Education (SBOE). State Board members are appointed by region. There are different levels of authority among the state legislature, SBOE and DPI.

10. FY22 Budget Update

Dr. McDaris gave a summary of the Senate's proposed budget for FY22. It contains big tax cuts along with raises for most state employees, though not as much as hoped for based on the large amount of revenue the state has to work with. The Senate budget provides a 1.5% raise for most state employees (including teachers, principals and other school personnel) in each year of the biennium, for a total 3% raise over the next two years. It provides a \$1,500 bonus for all state employees making less than \$75,000 a year and a \$1,000 bonus for all state employees making over \$75,000. Teachers and principals would receive an additional \$300 bonus. There is no cost of living adjustment for retired state employees in the Senate budget. The Senate's budget is expected to get its final vote by the weekend. The House will then release its budget. Once the two chambers have agreed on a final version, the budget will go to the Governor's desk.

11. FY22 Interim Budget Resolution

Each June, the board must approve an interim budget resolution in order to pay salaries and normal operating expenses for the period beginning July 1 of the new fiscal year until the final budget resolution is adopted. ON A MOTION BY MR. GRIFFIN, SECONDED BY MRS. DOMOKUR, the board unanimously adopted an interim budget resolution for the period beginning July 1, 2021 until adoption of the 2021-2022 budget resolution (see attached).

12. Bond Projects Update

Norris Barger reported good participation at the RHS bid opening on June 16. There may be some re-bids on June 25. The BHS bid opening will be held on June 23 with rebids on July 1. Representatives from Vannoy and Clark-Nexsen will attend the special board meeting on July 13 to discuss the bids.

Mr. Jackson asked how much the school system has spent this year in total. Mr. Barger reported that we have not yet completed the current fiscal year; he will present year-end budget amendments at the July 19 meeting. Mr. Jackson asked about the local budget. Chairman McCoy reported that she had spoken with Chairman Chappell and he does not anticipate any changes from what was proposed previously. The county is holding a 2% reserve for potential state raises, but that could change depending on the final state budget.

13. <u>Report from NCSBA Training Activity</u>

North Carolina statute requires board of education members to receive a minimum of 12 hours of professional development training every two years. Local board policy requires members who attend a professional development activity to give a report of the event to other board members. On June 17-18, Marty Griffin attended the NCSBA Summer Policy Conference. He reported on sessions that he had attended on student discipline, extracurricular activities and liability insurance, professional development for teachers related to the new mental health plan, what schools learned this past year regarding remote learning, and return-to-work concerns related to employees with "long-haul" COVID-19 health issues. He also emphasized the need for administrators and teachers to have a clear understanding of board policies and the difference between policy and practice.

15. Important Dates

The schedule for the superintendent's 2020-2021 evaluation calls for the board to meet in closed session on July 19 to prepare a consensus evaluation. Two members will not be in attendance on July 19 meeting; therefore, Dr. McDaris recommended that the board postpone the closed session until the full board will be present on August 2. He and the board would then meet on August 16 to review the evaluation and discuss performance goals for the next year. There was consensus agreement to revise the evaluation timeline as described.

INTERIM BUDGET RESOLUTION

2021-2022

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE TRANSYLVANIA COUNTY BOARD OF
