1. <u>Approval of Agenda</u>

MR. WIENER MADE A MOTION to add Superintendent's Opening Comments as agenda item no. 2 after approval of the agenda. MRS. DALTON SECONDED. ON A MOTION BY MR. WIENER, SECONDED BY MRS. DALTON, the agenda was unanimously approved as amended.

2. <u>Superintendent's Opening Comments</u>

Ballgame Statement

This past Thursday, we held a JV football game at Brevard High School, where a player from the opposing team suffered a serious injury—a compound fracture. I want to address the concerns raised by our community regarding the presence of emergency services at the game. While schools are only required by state policy to have one athletic trainer present at a football game, we had more than that. We had our athletic trainer, a former athletic trainer who is now a physician assistant (PA), an additional first responder/athletic trainer, and the volunteer from the Rescue Squad.

It's important to note that County EMS has not been required at interscholastic games for over 15 years. The Rescue Squad, which is not a county department, was present and is the agency many school systems work with for first responder presence, whether in staffing or with a transport vehicle. When the injury occurred, our trainers immediately responded and determined that the player needed to be transported to a hospital. They called 911, and while ambulance response typically takes about 14 minutes, we were fortunate that County EMS arrived in just 10 minutes along with Brevard Fire and Rescue.

As always, we are committed to improving where possible. The county is arranging a meeting between EMS and school staff to ensure that everyone is familiar with our most current emergency action plan and that the ambulance knows where to go during an emergency. We value our partnerships with county departments, fire departments and the rescue squad.

Threats Statement

On September 4, a tragic school shooting took place at a high school in Winder, Georgia, claiming the lives of four individuals and injuring several others. Even those who weren't physically harmed were deeply affected. Since this event, threats to schools across nearby states, including our own, have increased. Today, we experienced another threat aimed at our schools, similar to those in Arizona and other parts of North Carolina.

I want to make it absolutely clear: we will seek felony charges against anyone who makes threats or incites fear within our schools. This is a serious matter, and we will not tolerate behavior that puts our students or staff in harm's way.

Parents, I urge you to monitor what your children are posting on social media. Even sharing threatening messages can lead to severe consequences. Please talk to your children about the seriousness of this issue and report anything suspicious to law enforcement or school administrators right away.

On December 1 of last year, I personally experienced the terror of a false report of students and a teacher being shot in a classroom. Although it was thankfully untrue, law enforcement responded as they should, bringing in a mass casualty unit to the school. It was a terrifying scene for teachers and students, many of whom believed their colleagues or friends had been shot. No one in this county should ever have to endure that kind of fear.

Together, we can stop this. I am thankful for the dedicated efforts of our Sheriff's Department and our School Resource Officers (SROs), who work tirelessly to keep our students and staff safe.

3. Public Comment

Chairman Jackson reviewed the guidelines for public comment.

Alan Winchester – I would like to talk about rental houses and apartments and affordable housing. Starting salaries for teachers makes it hard to attract teachers in our county. To attract new teachers, this problem has to change. I represent Transylvania Home Trust. We plan to build homes adjacent to RHS to attract new teachers to our schools in order to provide affordable teacher homes in perpetuity. We are close to our fundraising goal. It will take our entire community to solve our housing crisis. I encourage the school system to earmark the land on Confederal Lane to help with this problem.

Claudia Hawkins – I am appending Alan's comments. When the Land Trust was formed, we had to get legislation passed through the General Assembly. I encourage you to hold the Confederate Lane property open for this purpose.

Jami Reese – I had a conversation with a teacher today. This teacher taught for 24 years here. She is now leaving to go to a neighboring county. Her classroom was 80 degrees today. This teacher did not feel like she was being heard when she complained. Please survey the people in those buildings. Teachers and students. Do what they need first. They are the ones that matter.

4. <u>Good News Report</u>

Dr. Fletcher shared the following good news:

September is Attendance Awareness Month

6. Policy: Spring 2024 Custom Updates & July Special Custom Update

Dr. Brian Weaver presented 18 policies from the NCSBA Spring 2024 PLS Custom Updates and one policy from the July 2024 Special Custom Updates as first-read information. The 19 updates contained revisions to 17 existing policies and two new policies. ON A MOTION BY MRS. MCCOY, SECONDED BY MR. WIENER, the 19 policies listed below were accepted as first-read information.

- **1310/4002, Parental Involvement.** Adds language from SBE policy PRNT-002 in subsection C.2.e. In subsection C.3., adds a reference to the notifications required by law when a school and/or school system is identified as low-performing. Clarifies language in subsection C.4.g. In Section H, references the reporting requirements of SBE policy PRNT-002. Corrects minor errors in Section D. Updates the legal references.
- **1510/4200/7270, School Safety.** Provision added to Section D.3 regarding training on recognizing and reporting threats. New Section E added to address statutorily required threat assessment teams. Legal references, cross references, and other resources were updated.

Mr. O'Neill expressed concerns about the amount of time it will take to train the threat assessment teams.

- 1760/7280, Prohibition Against Retaliation. Clarifies language.
- **2127, Board Member Technology Use.** Changes Twitter to X. Revises the language in subsection C.3.c to reflect the new legal standard established in a recent U.S. Supreme Court case. Updates legal references.
- **3220, Technology in the Educational Program.** Adds new Section D to address the use of generative artificial intelligence (AI). Adds information on training on the use of generative AI in Section E. Updates the other resources.

Mr. O'Neill expressed concerns about sufficient safeguards for AI use.

- **3225/4312/7320, Technology Responsible Use.** In Section G, references generative AI guidelines as described in policy 3220. Adds other resources.
- **3420, Student Promotion and Accountability.** Creates new Section K to address students receiving high school credit for courses taken while studying abroad. Adds a reference to three-year high school graduation in Section L. Updates the legal references.

Mr. O'Neill recommended including the program or institution attended. *Mr.* Wiener recommended requiring sealed samples of work completed to document what was taught.

• **3460, Graduation Requirements.** Adds new student notice requirements in the paragraph preceding Section A. Reorganizes information from the paragraph preceding Section A into other parts of the policy. Adds a reference in Section A to policy 3420 in regard to credit for courses taken abroad. Changes the local

graduation "requirements" to local graduation "recommendations." Adds information in C.4 regarding gradation high school in three years. Updates the diploma endorsements language. Includes various other minor changes. Updates the legal references. Custom language in c.7 has been removed for consistency with G.S.115C-83.31(c).

3620, Extracurricular Activities and Student Organizations. Removes the local attendance standard for interscholastic athletics participation in light of the new SBE attendance standard effective July 1, 2024. Removes language referencing NCHSAA eligibility rules and adds a reference to applicable eligibility standards of law in B.1.a. Adds a new subsection B.1.c to grant students who transfer schools within the school system immediate eligibility to participate in interscholastic athletics. Adds a new subsection B.1.d to address the participation of home school students in interscholastic athletics (The board must select one of the three options. The county athletic director, high school principals, and school athletic directors recommend Option 2 with local modifications). Removes C.3. Includes other minor editorial changes. Updates the legal references.

Mr. Wiener questioned why staff selected Option 2 and not Option 1. Dr. Weaver reported that Option 2 has been the standard practice for our system. Our staff knows the students who are participating.

- **4040/7310, Staff-Student Relations.** Revises language in subsection C.4 to reference policy 7130, which now contains the reporting requirements from new 16 N.C.A.C.6C .0608. Updates legal references and cross references.
- 4140, Foreign Exchange Students (NEW). Addresses the admission of foreign exchange students with J-1 visa status.
- 4240/7312, Child Abuse and Related Threats to Child Safety. Revises language in Section D to reference policy 7130, which now contains the reporting requirements from new 16 N.C.A.C.6C .0608. In Section H, adds a new statutory requirement that applies with the beginning of the 2024-2025 school year. Updates legal references and cross references.
- **4270/6145, Concussion and Head Injury.** Updates statutory references throughout the policy. Includes other minor changes. Updates legal references and other resources.
- 5023/6128/7268, Emergency Administration of Naloxone (NEW). Addresses the emergency use of naloxone on school property.
- **5071/7351, Electronically Stored Information Retention.** Updates legal references.
- 6125, Administering Medicines to Students. Updates the division names of N.C. Department of Health and Human Services. Updates the other resources.

- **7130, Licensure.** Adds new Section F regarding mandatory reporting of misconduct. Updates legal references.
- **8340, Insurance.** Amends the language to include not just insurance but also other types of liability coverage.
- **8510, School Finance Officer.** Updates the duties of the school finance officer based on the information in State Board of Education Policy FINO-000. Adds new Section C regarding continuing professional education. Updates legal references and cross references.

7. <u>41 Confederate Lane Property</u>

At a previous meeting, the board tabled a resolution to declare as surplus the property located at 41 Confederate Lane, Brevard, in order to consider other options for the property, specifically teacher housing. Board Attorney Chris Campbell informed the board that North Carolina session law allows a board to enter into a land trust if property is declared as surplus under specific circumstances. MR. WIENER MOVED to table further discussion and let the board attorney and superintendent look into options for transferring the 41 Confederal Lane property to a local land trust. MRS. DALTON SECONDED. Dr. Fletcher reported that she would send a copy of the articles of incorporation for the local land trust to the board members as information. She also reported that there is an outstanding tax bill on the property and a lot of cleanup to be done. Chairman Jackson suggested that the county planning board may be able to clean up the property at no cost. There was no further discussion and the motion passed unanimously.

8. Update on Proposal for Bond Project Manager

Dr. Fletcher reported that she and the county manager are scheduled to meet this Wednesday to begin negotiations. There was a water lead at TCH last week. This is a prime example of how there will always be something to keep Mr. Putman busy and why a bond project manager is needed.

9. <u>Facilities</u>

Facilities Director Kerry Putnam reported that he is getting bids on the Rosman High School football field drainage issue. There is a bid opening on the 10th. He is working on discovery for the RHS retaining wall. The TCH water outage was fixed on Sunday. On Friday, a gutter leak was discovered at BMS that will be a fairly large fix. Axios did not catch it. Mr. Putnam is aware of hotspots in some classrooms and is working on solutions. Cosmetic work on the BHS arches is going well. Workers found some extensive dry rot that was not seen previously. The engineer came back out to evaluate and feels that we are still in the safety zone at this time. Mr. Putnam reported that he would not allow students inside if there were a heavy snow load on the old gym roof. Mr. Jackson asked about converting flat roofs to pitched roofs. That is being explored.

10. Nominations for NCSBA Board of Directors

As discussed on August 19, the North Carolina School Boards Association is seeking nominations for vacancies on the 2024-2025 Board of Directors. The term of service is two years and members are eligible to serve for two terms. The board holds meetings in November, March, June and September. In addition, each board member typically serves on two committees that meet once or twice during the year. Nominations must be made by official board action by October 2, 2024. CHAIRMAN JACKSON NOMINATED CHRIS WIENER to submit an application for the NCSBA Board of Directors. MRS. MCCOY SECONDED, and the nomination was unanimously approved.

11. <u>Report(s) from Training Event(s)</u>

Mr. Wiener and Mr. O'Neill attended the WRESA/LEAD training event on September 4, 2024 at the Western Region Educational Service Alliance in Asheville. Mr. Wiener reported that he has posted the meeting materials into a shared drive for the board members to review. Topics of interest included the NCSBS legislative agenda and a draft job description for school board members.
