The Transvlvania County Board of Education (the "board") recognizes the critical role of parents 1 2 in the education of their children and in the schools. The board directs school administrators to 3 develop programs that will promote and support parental involvement in student learning and 4 achievement at school and at home and encourage successful progress toward graduation. Each 5 parent is encouraged to learn about the educational program, the educational goals and objectives 6 of the school system, and his or her own child's progress. The board also encourages parents to 7 participate in activities designed by school personnel to involve them, such as parent 8 conferences, in order to encourage effective communication. 9 10 The board directs each principal or designee to develop a parental involvement plan as a part of the school improvement plan. This plan must include, at a minimum, efforts that meet the 11 12 requirements established in this policy. In addition, the plan must include ways to enhance 13 parental involvement in the following areas: 14 15 1. meaningful two-way communication between home and school; 16 17 2. involvement of parents and guardians in student learning; 18 19 promotion of volunteering; 3. 20 involvement of parents and guardians in school decisions that affect children and 21 4. 22 families: 23 24 5. community collaboration; and 25 26 6. promotion of student health awareness. 27 28 This policy applies to the parents, legal guardians, and legal custodians of students who are 29 under 18 years old and are not married. 30 31 A. PARENT COMMUNICATION AND CONFERENCES 32 33 The board encourages school personnel to have regular contact with parents for 34 commendation as well as for notification of concerns. Principals or designees shall plan 35 for periodic communication with parents. Teachers are responsible for scheduling 36 conferences with parents. 37 38 The principal or designee shall strive, through oral or written communication or other 39 means, to include the parents of students identified as at-risk in the implementation and 40 review of academic and/or behavioral interventions for their children, in accordance with 41 policy 3405, Students at Risk of Academic Failure.

43 The principal or designee shall provide the parent of each student in kindergarten, first, or 44 second grade with written notification of the student's reading progress. The notice will

be provided three times a year, following each benchmark assessment, and will include: (1) assessment results, (2) whether the child may not reach reading proficiency by the end of third grade, and (3) instructional support activities for use at home.

The board encourages the superintendent to work with local business leaders, including the local chambers of commerce, to encourage employers to adopt as part of their stated personnel policies time for employees who are parents or guardians to attend conferences with their child's teachers.

## **B. PARENTAL NOTIFICATION**

Each principal or designee of a Title I school shall effectively notify parents of all parental rights and other required information regarding Title I schools and programs, in accordance with federal law. Parents of students in Title I schools shall receive a copy of the system-wide Title I parent and family engagement policy (policy 1320/3560) and the school-wide parent involvement plan.

In addition, annually every building principal or designee shall effectively notify parents of the following:

- 1. parental rights related to student records (see policy 4700, Student Records);
