The Transylvania County Board of Education (the "board") recognizes that students may need to 1 2 take medication during school hours, enabling students to attend school, to maintain or improve 3 their health, and/or to improve their potential for learning. School personnel may administer 4 medication prescribed by a physician or other health care practitioner upon the written request of 5 the a student's parents. In limited circumstances, a student may be authorized to self-administer 6 To minimize disruptions to the school day, students should take medicines medications. 7 medications should be taken at home rather than at school whenever feasible. For purposes of this policy, all references to "parent" include parents, legal guardians, and legal
custodians. In addition, for purposes of this policy, the term "health care practitioner" is limited
to licensed medical professionals who are legally authorized to prescribe medications under
North Carolina law, such as doctors of medicine, doctors of osteopathic medicine, physician
assistants, and nurse practitioners.

19A.Standards For Administering Medicines Medication Administration by20School Employees

1. Conditions for Administering Medication

Authorized Sschool employees are authorized to may administer medication to students when all of the following conditions have been are met. These conditions apply to all medications, including those available over-the-counter without a prescription.

- a. Parental Consent: The student's parent must make or legal custodian has made a signed, written request that authorizes school personnel to administer the medication to the student. and has given explicit written instructions describing the manner in which the medication is to be administered.
- b. Medication Authorization/Order: A physician or other health care practitioner must prescribe has prescribed the medication for use by the student and provide explicit written instructions for administering the medication. or has authorized the use of over the counter medication(s). Prescription medications must be properly labeled with the name of the student and must be in the original prescription bottle or other packaging. Non-prescription, over the counter medication also must be in the original container or other packaging.

packaging and accompanied by a completed medication authorization form. Parents who want school personnel to administer over-the counter medication must provide the medication to school personnel pursuant to the requirements of this policy.

137 B. EMERGENCY MEDICATION138

139 Students who are at risk for medical emergencies, such as those with diabetes, asthma, or 140 severe allergies, or diabetes, must have an emergency health care plan developed for 141 them to address emergency administration of medicine medication. Only a student who 142 is at risk for a medical emergency will be permitted to self-carry emergency medication 143 while in transit to and from school or school-sponsored events. Students must meet the 144 requirements of subsection A.1, above, including providing authorization and instructions 145 from the health care practitioner and written consent of the parent, in order for emergency 146 medication to be administered by school personnel while the student is at school, at a 147 school sponsored activity, and/or while in transit to or from school or a school-sponsored 148 event.

150 C. STUDENT SELF-ADMINISTERING ASTHMA AND DIABETES MEDICATIONS

152 The board recognizes that students with certain health conditions like diabetes or asthma 153 and/or an allergy that could result in subject to an anaphylactic reactions, may need to 154 possess and self-administer asthma medication on school property in accordance with 155 their individualized health care plan or emergency health care plan. The board also 156 recognizes that students with diabetes may need to possess and self administer certain 157 medication on school property. As used in this section of the policy, "asthma 158 medication" means refers to a medicine prescribed for the treatment of diabetes, asthma, 159 or anaphylactic reactions and includes insulin or a source of glucose, a prescribed asthma inhaler, or a prescribed epinephrine auto-injector, and "diabetes medication" means a 160 medicine prescribed for the treatment of diabetes and includes insulin, glucose, or 161 162 Glucagon. The superintendent or designee shall develop procedures for the possession 163 and self-administration of asthma and diabetes such medication by students on school 164 property, during the school day, at school-sponsored activities, and/or while in transit to 165 or from school or school-sponsored events.

Before a student will be allowed to self-administer medication pursuant to this section, the student's parent or guardian must provide to the principal or designee all of the documents listed below:

a. written authorization from the student's parent or guardian for the student to possess and self-administer the asthma or diabetes medication;

2. Responsibilities of the Student

A student who is authorized in accordance with this policy to carry medication for self-administration must carry the medication in the original labeled container with the student's name on the label.

3. Consequences for Improper Use

A student who uses his or her prescribed asthma or diabetes medication in a manner other than as prescribed or who permits another person to use the medication may be subject to disciplinary action pursuant to the school disciplinary policy. However, school officials shall not No one may impose disciplinary action on the student that limits or restricts the student's immediate access to the diabetes, asthma, or diabetes anaphylactic medication.

The board does not assume any responsibility for the administration of medication to a student by the student, the student's parent, or legal custodian, or any other person who is not authorized by this policy to administer medications to students.
