37		"Administering Medicines to Students." The principal may authorize other lawful uses						
38		of substances that are otherwise prohibited by this policy, such as for approved school						
39		projects.

47		The disciplinary consequences for violations of this policy shall be consistent with policy	
48		JFC, "Student Conduct/Discipline." All prohibited behaviors outlined in section A of this	
49		policy are deemed to constitute "serious violations" pursuant to Policy JFC, "Student	
50		Conduct/Discipline," and the disciplinary consequences for those prohibited behaviors	
51		shall be consistent therewith. The superintendent or designee shall list in the Code of	
52		Student Conduct the specific range of consequences that may be imposed on a student for	
53		violations of this policy.

55 56	C.	Suspension for Substance Abuse Offenders Program	
57		The Transylvania County Board of Education is committed to maintaining schools that	
58		are free of alcohol and drugs. Therefore, in an effort to maintain drug and alcohol free	
59		schools, the principal, with permission by the superintendent, shall suspend for the	
60		remainder of the school year any student who is found to be guilty of using alcohol or	
61		drugs on educational property, being on educational property after having consumed	
62		alcohol or drugs, possessing or having on his/her person alcohol or drugs, or storing	
63		alcohol or drugs in any location on educational property. This includes use or possession	
64		of alcohol or drugs at any school related/sponsored function whether on or off	
65		educational property.

67		At the same time, the school system The Board is concerned for the well-being of	
68		students who are substance abuse offenders and recognizes their need to remain in school	
69		and continue their education. Therefore, an alternative to long-term suspension may be	
70		provided for first-time substance abuse offenders voluntary participation in Transylvania	
71		County Schools' Substance Abuse Offenders Program may be provided, in conjunction	
72		with other disciplinary consequences, as an alternative to long-term suspension for first-	
73		time substance abuse offenders. A possible alternative is as follows:

154		When a school administrator has a reasonable basis to believe that a student is using or i	S
155		under the influence of alcohol or a controlled substance at school or a school activity, th	e
156		school administrator may offer the student, with the student's parent(s)' written	
157		permission, the opportunity to take a drug test, at Board expense. The purpose of this te	st
158		is to determine whether the administrator's suspicion is justified. If test results are	
159		positive for the presence of drugs, the results shall be considered relevant corroborative	
160		evidence of a violation of this policy. If the test result(s) is negative for the presence of	
161		alcohol and/or an illegal drug(s), the student shall be found innocent of the allegations o	
162		misconduct. A decision by the student or the student's parents not to be tested shall not	
163		be used against the student. In such an event, the school administrator shall base his/her	C
164		disciplinary decision solely on the information obtained during the investigation of the	
165		alleged misconduct.
